- Supervision will end at 3:25 and all remaining students will be taken to the office to contact family.

- We do not want anyone crossing the street unless at a crosswalk.
- Safety for ALL is our priority.

Supplies

If you ordered supplies for your child, they should arrive on the first day of school. If you did not order a box, no worries, here is a <u>list of supplies</u> that we are requesting. If your child needs any support in getting supplies or if you would like to donate extra supplies, please contact me directly and we will work to ensure all students have a successful start to the school year.

Snacks: Fifth graders will have recess then lunch starting at 12:00 pm this year. We encourage students to bring a healthy snack to eat during the morning. Something quick and easy that does NOT require silverware and has a minimum of mess, is ideal. Please, no chips or junk food and no peanuts due to allergies.

Drinks: Students should bring a reusable water bottle, labeled with their name (no glass,

please). Bottles that can close tightly without leaks are preferred. Juice or other drinks are not allowed in the classroom, but students may bring those types of drinks to lunch.

5th Grade Content

<u>MATH</u>

We will begin our year extending students' understanding about place value. During our first module, students will learn about base ten from millions to thousandths. They will use exponents to name place value units and will work with powers of ten.

Key 5th Grade Math Concepts:

- Deepening understanding of the place value system
- Operations with multi-digit whole numbers and decimals to hundredths
- Equivalent fractions as a strategy to add and subtract fractions
- Multiply and divide fractions
- Understand concepts of volume and relate to multiplication and division
- Graph points in the coordinate plane to solve real-world and mathematical problems

SCIENCE

We will be learning about space, sound, energy, and the human body this year!

LITERACY

Reading: All incoming 5th grade students should read chapter-length fiction or nonfiction books that are at or above grade level. NewsELA is a great tool for students to read non-fiction current events articles online (www.newsela.com - use the free version/no account necessary).

- Our first two literacy units focus on the topics of the American Revolution and human rights around the globe, through high-level novel analysis, reader's theater, and advanced multi-paragraph informational writing. Some recommended resources that could be interesting at-home reads to prepare for 5th grade curriculum are:
 - Events Leading to the American Revolution by Linda Wade
 - African Americans and American Indians Fighting the Revolutionary War by John Miklos
 - Climbing Out of the Great Depression by Sean Price
 - Poetry for Young People: Maya Angelou

<u>Writing</u>: Incoming 5th grade students must capitalize correctly, write in complete sentences and use end punctuation correctly. They should have mastered paragraphs and be able to write multi-paragraph essays. In nonfiction writing, students should be comfortable citing evidence to support their thinking and be able to find the main ideas of texts and articles.
